Greater Choice of Classes and Hours Open At Harbor College

Admission procedures for new students at Los Angeles Harbor College were outlined today by William H. McMasters, Assistant Dean of Admissions and Guidance. "Since the January 21 deadline for applying for admission is fast approaching it would benefit all prospective students to complete all the necessary steps as soon as possible," McMasters explains. "A wider choice of classes and hours will be available to the student completing all requirements early."

To secure a permit to register, new and returning students, must file an application for admission, a permit request, and a residence statement with the Admissions Office. They must also present a record of polio immunization. All applicants under 25 years of age must submit high school transcripts as well as transcripts for college work attempted.

Entrance tests are also required of all entering freshmen and transfer students with less than a C average. Appointments for the tests can be made at the Admission Office. The battery of three tests approximately 3 hours to complete. These examinations will be given on the following dates:

Art Students Here To Compete For Many Scholastic Art Awards

Promising young artists from Southern California junior and senior high schools again will have the opportunity to demonstrate their talents in the regional Scholastic Art Awards competition. It was announced today.

This will be the 20th consecutive year that the event has been held in the Los Angeles area, under the co-sponsorship of Scholastic Magazine and Bullock's Downtown according to Aylsworth Kleinhauer, art supervisor, curriculum branch, Los Angeles City Schools and chairman of the Regional Advisory Committee for the awards program.

A screening committee composed of Southern California art teachers and supervisors will select nearly 1,000 pieces of art for public exhibition at Bullock's Downtown for two weeks starting Feb. 12, 1966.

From these, a jury of prominent artists and art critics will choose 300 of the best entries to receive traditional gold keys of achievement. This group will then be further narrowed to the 200 blue ribbon winners which will be entered as finalists in the 39th annual national Scholastic Art Awards Competition in New York later in the year.

Honors bestowed in the national event will include scholarship, gold medals, special cash awards and the distinction of display at the National High School Art Exhibition in New York.

Approximately 6,000 entries are expected in the 18 arts and crafts classifications and two photography divisions.

Participating will be art students from Los Angeles, Orange, Ventura, Kern, Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo Counties.

Members of the 1966 Regional Advisory Committee, in addition to Kleinhauer are Donald O. Williams, co-chairman, art supervisor, secondary schools, Los Angeles City Schools; Theodore Westinger, co-chairman, art supervisor, secondary schools, Los Angeles City Schools, and many others.

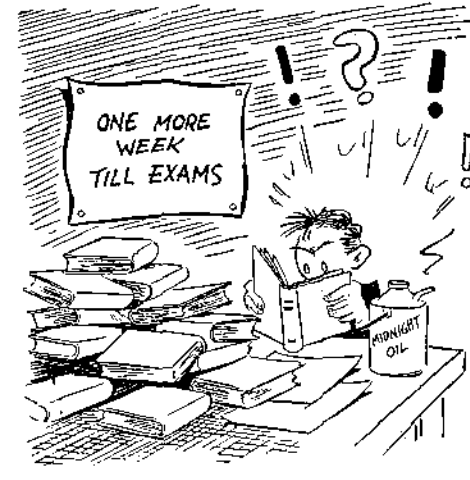

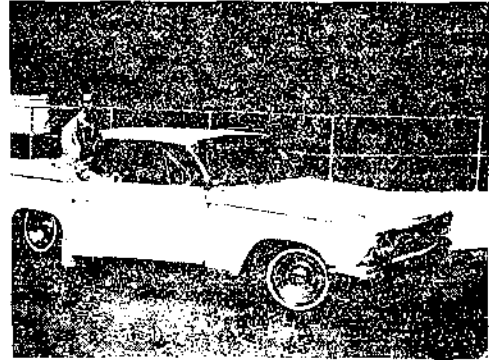
